REVIEW GAME: WHAT'S THE QUESTION?



INSTRUCTION SHEET

INSTRUCTIONS:

A teacher-led review game for the whole class. The class can be divided into teams of 3-5 students without papers, pens or resource materials. Students within the teams take turns getting the “answer” read to them orally for which they must prepare a grammatically-matched question. The other team members can help the student prepare his/her question, but it shouldn’t be written down. Within a reasonable time limit, the student must ask the question to match the “answer”. If it’s correct, the team receives two points. If it’s incorrect, another team has the opportunity to make the question for one bonus point. Turns rotate through the teams, with scores (and mini-grammar lessons) recorded on the board.

REQUIRED STRUCTURES: Yes/No questions, information questions, agreeing and disagreeing.

REQUIRED VOCABULARY: *provincial government, responsible, # years old and older, family member, interpret, ER, specialists, eye examinations, free, permanent resident, medications, taking (new patients)*

GROUP SIZE: whole class divided into teams or individual or pairs of higher level students.

HANDOUTS: none for students, What’s the Question? sheet for instructor

OTHER MATERIALS REQUIRED: none

RELATED GRAMMAR: auxiliary verbs, “Wh-” question words

FOLLOW-UP ACTIVITIES:

Students make up their own “answers” from the text.

WORK SHEET

READ THESE "ANSWERS" INDIVIDUALLY TO TEAMS FOR THEM TO CREATE A CORRECT CORRESPONDING QUESTION. (NOTE THAT QUESTIONS MAY VARY, BUT THEY SHOULD MATCH THE INFORMATION AND VERB TENSE OF THE "ANSWER")

For example:

"answer": No, you do not need to pay for hospital insurance.

student's question: Do you need to pay for hospital insurance?

"answer": You need to wait at least two months before receiving insurance protection.

students' question: How long do you have to wait for insurance protection?

- 1. A:** You should go to the Emergency Department of a hospital.
- 2. A:** No, MSP will not pay for an ambulance.
- 3. A:** The provincial government is responsible for health care.
- 4. A:** Call 1-800-663-7100 for information.
- 5. A:** People 65 years old and older get a special Gold Care Card.
- 6. A:** No, MSP is not free.
- 7. A:** A family member or friend can interpret English for you at ER.
- 8. A:** British Columbia has family doctors and specialists.
- 9. A:** No, eye examinations are not free.
- 10. A:** You don't have to pay for hospital costs if you are a permanent resident.
- 11. A:** Call an ambulance for an emergency.
- 12. A:** If you need an ambulance, call 911.
- 13. A:** A pharmacist can answer questions about medications.
- 14. A:** No, you do not need a prescription for over-the-counter drugs.
- 15. A:** Ask your friends and neighbours or ask your local hospital for a list of doctors who are taking new patients.
